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A GROWING NEED TO ACCESS CREDIBLE, SAFE, AND COMPLIANT CONTRACTORS

Living in a turbulent time has become the 'new normal' and the aftermath of Covid-19, has left a lasting imprint on the workforce in many industries. The pandemic accelerated an already steady shift of contractors leaving the labour market, leaving a significant shortage of skill and labour. This is largely due to workers retiring or changing careers that offer higher salaries, Generation Z lifestyle and career choices, the desire to have work-life balance and evolving age demographics.

For organizations, it has become increasingly difficult to source and establish long-term partnerships with contractors in the supply chain. This has led to safety and procurement teams adopting a reactive, 'quick fix' contractor management approach, just to get the job completed. This leads to increased challenges and business risk, such as:

- Costly and time intensive internal pre-qualification processes
- Regulatory non-compliance leading to reputational damage
- Increased risk of safety accidents and incidents

Just as workloads are ramping back up after three years of disruption, organizations are not able to find the right people with the necessary skills to carry out essential work needed to keep their business running, and the problem is more acute now than ever before.

The shortage of skilled labour and qualified contractors means that for hiring client organizations, there is a growing need to make sure they can access credible, safe, and compliant contractors.

To demonstrate due diligence and compliance and to ensure business continuity, organizations need to implement a robust and strategic approach to contractor management as an enabler for growth.



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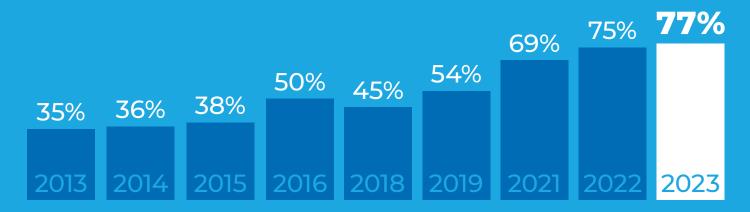

SKILLS GAP, LABOUR SHORTAGE AND THE IMPACT OF THIS CHALLENGE

The threat of skill shortage is not a new one. For years, industries such as healthcare, hospitality, logistics and construction have struggled to recruit the right talent, and it has only become worse since the pandemic. The most common reason for businesses finding vacancies more difficult to fill were a low number of applications and a lack of qualified applicants.

For example, the construction industry in Canada is struggling to source contractors to help meet the phenomenal demand for house building. There's a need for over 100,000 new skilled contractors and an average job vacancy rate of 6.6%, which is significantly higher than average, with manufacturing and mining at 4%.

To solve the ongoing people and skill shortage crisis, safety and procurement teams will be required to re-think and adapt their approach. Organizations can't keep 'plugging the gaps' and regardless of sector, at the core is the need to hire contractors who have the right skills and are safe and compliant to do the job.

For organizations who rely on contractors, the key to achieving this is to establish strong working relationships with existing contractors, and implement a robust sourcing and qualification strategy for new partnerships. This will help to safeguard against short-term and long-term risk and give organizations better control of their business performance. At its simplest, it's about quality control.

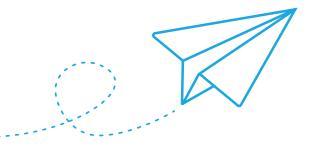
